PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Happy New Year to everyone! We hope the coming year is better than the last: that voting becomes easier, not more difficult, especially for the most disadvantaged; that immigrants are welcomed and treated with warmth and respect and that immigration reform is addressed; and that climate change, which threatens all life and everyone's future, is adequately addressed. We have many hopes, but they all depend on commitment and action.

Our Democracy is fragile and must be tended to, supported, and revived if it is to survive and thrive. The ideals and foundation of Democracy have always been strengthened and rekindled by immigrants, who often value and appreciate the fundamentals of Democracy even more than many U.S.-born citizens. Most of our ancestors came to the U.S. to escape persecution, famine, and strife, looking for a land of opportunity and freedom. We must remember that and continually work to keep their hopes and dreams alive for all.

On a different but related note, if you have yet to go to Crystal Bridges in Bentonville, Arkansas, you must go there. It is a magnificent world-class art museum funded by Alice Walton, with beautiful, extensive outdoor grounds and trails. It has many wonderful permanent and new exhibits and an excellent Speakers Series. We spent two days there between Christmas and New Year's Day and saw the exhibit "We the People: The Radical Notion of Democracy," which ends on January 2. Included in the Exhibit is the official first edition of the 1787 U.S. Constitution by John Dunlap and David Claypoole, printers, as well as an original 1823 engraving by William J. Stone of the Declaration of Independence and an early copy of the Bill of Rights, one with the originally proposed 17 amendments and one with the final 14 amendments.

A highlight for us was the related speaker series which featured Liz Cheney, who flew straight from the last January 6 U.S. House Committee Meeting to address a sold-out crowd that same day. We had the good fortune of listening to her live on the Crystal Bridges website. She was very knowledgeable, inspiring, and insightful. Fortunately, her talk was recorded, and you can view her talk at the


Please share it with young people and others you know who interact with young adults. They are our future. We need them informed, knowledgeable and active if Democracy is to survive and thrive.

A MEMORABLE FOUNDER'S DAY CELEBRATION

Our December 11 Founders Day Celebration in the Friends Room of the Library was delightful, refreshing, enjoyable, and well-attended. About 45 members gathered in person to celebrate the Founding of our local League 103 years ago! (Last year and the year before, we celebrated Founders Day virtually on Zoom.)

We enjoyed savory and sweet mini biscuits from Ozark Mountain Biscuit Co., as well as tea, coffee, and cookies as Verna Laboy entertained and educated us about the amazing and accomplished life of Annie Fisher.

Annie Fisher was a consummate cook, caterer, and businesswoman. She was born on December 3, 1867, in Boone County, Missouri, the daughter of the formerly enslaved Robert and Charlotte Knowles. From an early age, Annie worked to help support her family. She attended school when possible but did not complete her education.

In 1904 the Louisiana Purchase Exposition was held in St. Louis. Annie Fisher entered her beaten biscuits and reportedly won a gold medal. She worked as a cook for the George Bingham Rollins family in Columbia and the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity at the University of Missouri before starting her own catering business. People fell in love with her country ham and beaten biscuits. She catered events of all sizes and owned enough silver, linen, and china for one thousand place settings. Outstanding Citizen of the Year

The Outstanding Citizen of the Year award was given to Mel and Barbara West, founders of Mobility Worldwide, which supplies wheeled carts for disabled persons in developing nations, the Festival of Sharing project, and the Fun City Youth Academy. Although in their 90s, they continue to be deeply committed and involved in those organizations.

Diane Suhler spoke about why she nominated the Wests for this award. (Her statement follows this article.) Mel West accepted the award and told us about those organizations' history and continued work.

The Liz Schmidt Community Service Award

The Liz Schmidt Community Service Award was presented to City of Refuge for their outstanding work with Immigrants and Refugees in our Community. It was accepted by Stephanie Nichols, City of Refuge's Head of Community Engagement. City of Refuge is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization created to help refugees recover and regain control of their lives.

As persecution increases and people become more divided, it is urgent for our city to join together and stand for those in need. Over the past few years, thousands of women, children,

and men from Asia, Africa, and the Middle East have fled conflict and disaster, seeking a place to survive and recover in our community. Many do not speak English and arrive with only a few pieces of clothing and very little money. City of Refuge serves them by helping with their immediate needs, building relationships over time, and helping them acclimate to the Mid-Missouri area.

LWV OUTSTANDING CITIZENS FOR 2022: MEL AND BARBARA WEST

I have taught economics for many years and one of my favorite stories to share with students concerns the factors that led to the explosion in international trade since the 1950s. When asked, most people think the primary factors leading to increased trade have been very dramatic events—the development of the internet, new global tariff agreements, and

technology increasing the speed of travel and communication. No doubt, all of these events have been factors. However, overlooked is a simple, unassuming invention that changed the face of international trade — The "Box!" Container shipping has allowed goods to be loaded into a container and onto a ship at a point of origin and never (Cont'd on next page)

(Cont'd from pg 5) leave this container until ready to be unloaded at some final point of use. The container is often called the 'Humble Hero' of international trade—it has revolutionized international trade, but few among us are aware of its impact.


We have two 'Humble Heroes' in our midst who we are honoring today—Mel and Barbara West. They are a husband and wife team who has worked tirelessly for decades to improve the lives of those on the margins of society, but who have done so with no fanfare and no drum rolls. They have enormously impacted the lives of so many in a quiet and unassuming way. A brief look at some of their work will help us to understand their enormous impact.

Within Columbia, Mel and Barbara are perhaps best known as the founders of Mobility Worldwide, which supplies wheeled carts for disabled persons in developing nations. Mobility Worldwide is primarily a volunteer-based organization operating in 24 locations throughout the United States that makes hand crank wheelchairs for people around the world. The impact of these simple devices cannot be overstated. To quote Reverend West: "It is a lifechanging thing to see a person who is literally crawling on the ground, disabled by polio, birth defects, war amputation, land mine injury, to all of a sudden have mobility."



However, Mobility Worldwide is just the culmination of the many projects Reverend and Mrs. West have spearheaded. Many of us are familiar with Fun City Youth Academy. This organization was founded in 1970 at the grassroots level by Rev. and Mrs. West, Wynna Faye Elbert, and Beulah Ralph, with a mission to help keep inner-city youth from hanging out in the streets and getting into trouble. The program has grown over the years and continues to serve youth throughout our community—giving

them activities and mentoring so important for their lives. Some of the funding for Fun City comes from City commissions which I serve on. These commissions consistently rate Fun City as one of the most impactful organizations in our community.



Reverend and Mrs. West started the Festival of Sharing project in the 1980s. This is a collaborative effort among faith groups and other entities to respond to poverty and hunger in Missouri and throughout the world. Groups from across Missouri create gifts and kits to distribute to those in need free of charge. These include Personal Hygiene Packs, Family Food Boxes, Student Packs, Baby Bundle Packs, Reading and Writing Packs, and Women's Prison Packs, to name only a few. The monetary value of these donations is in the millions; the emotional and psychic value is immeasurable.

The list continues . . . We are all familiar with Habitat for Humanity. Barbara and Mel helped start Habitat for Humanity in Columbia and the surrounding counties. They were also instrumental in creating Koinonia House, a lodging place for low-income persons with family members in the hospital.

There can be no doubt that this 'duo' has positively impacted our world. Before concluding, I would like to share one small way in which I have been personally impacted by Reverend and Mrs. West. One day I was talking with Mel and he looked down (Cont'd on pg 10)

COLUMBIA ELECTRIC UTILITY UPDATE

Columbia is moving toward 100% renewable energy, hopefully by 2030. That will result in a huge (more than a third) reduction in greenhouse gas (GHG) production in Columbia.

The best thing individuals can do to help reduce GHG is to go all-electric in their homes. A major portion of a typical gas bill is for winter heating, often 80% or more of the annual total. Mini-split air-source heat pumps use less than half as much energy as a gas furnace because they extract heat from the outside air and move that heat into the house. The remainder of your gas is used for heating water and cooking. When that is all you are doing, the base rate is the majority of the bill, over \$160 annually.

Before you install a heat pump, learn about how you can benefit from rebates and special billing rates from the city: https://www.como.gov/utilities/columbia-power-partners/residential-

programs-and-tools/air-conditioner-and-heatpump-incentives/. Columbia Water & Light also offers low-interest loans for many residential improvements that improve energy efficiency. You need to contact them before you begin the process; see https://www.como.gov/utilities/columbia-power-partners/residential-programs-and-tools/home-performance-rebates-and-loans/

There are other things you can do to reduce GHG production. An electric car is a good idea, but most of us will only replace a car when we need a new car. Then you should get an electric vehicle. Fuel is under 4 cents per mile, \$8 for a 200-mile gas tank. Another good idea is putting solar panels on your home.

It is a great honor to introduce the recipients of the 2022 LWV Citizens of the Year award -- our 'Humble Heroes' – Mel and Barbara West.
