JULY 8 PROCLAMATION CEREMONY AT THE CAPITOL ROTUNDA

The Governor and Secretary of State have issued a proclamation in honor of the centennial of Missouri's ratification of the 19th Amendment. Missouri Governor Gardner signed the ratification on July 3, 1919.

On July 8, 2019, Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft will present the Proclamation to League members and friends at the Capitol Rotunda in Jefferson City at 2:00 p.m.

Prior to the ceremony, members from around the state will gather for lunch, if they wish, at noon at



Madison's Café in downtown Jefferson City.

JULY 14 FILM: "ONE WOMAN, ONE VOTE" THE HISTORY OF WOMEN'S STRUGGLE TO WIN THE VOTE

As part of our Centennial celebration, we will show the PBS documentary, "One Woman, One Vote" on Sunday, July 14, at 2 p.m. at the Columbia Public Library, with refreshments at 1:30 p.m. The library is cosponsoring this event.

The U.S. Congress passed the 19th Amendment in June 1919 and Missouri was the eleventh state to ratify it in July 1919. But it took more than 70 years to get to that momentous occasion. This film is a sweeping look at the women's suffrage movement, from Elizabeth Cady Stanton's famous Seneca Falls call to arms to the passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment.

Narrated by Susan Sarandon, the documentary features historical photos and video clips, as well as contextual commentary from historians.



The film delves into the deep divisions within the suffrage movement, like the split over the question of whether to support voting rights for black men. In addition, the film looks at regional differences within the movement and differences over whether to use militant tactics.

office when she ran for Congress in 1922. Walter Williams, founder of the MU Journalism School, called Luella "a steam engine in petticoats."

JUNE BOARD MEETING REPORT

The LWVCBC Board met on Monday, June 17, at the Unitarian Universalist Church.

We approved an Ed fund request for a **Constitution Day Program** to be held on September 18 at the Boone County Commission Chambers, featuring women judges. AAUW will co-sponsor the event and share the expenses as part of the Holly Burgess Public Policy Forums.

We approved a request from Physicians for a National Health Program (PNHP) to cosponsor a program about "Medicare for All" by Claudia Fegan, M.D., Chief Medical Officer for Cook County Medical Center. The event, which will occur on September 26 at noon in the Lester Bryant Auditorium of the Medical School Building, is intended to be educational.

The Board expressed a big **Thank You to Pam Springsteel** for the hard work she and the Fundraising Committee did for the fundraiser. Over 140 attended and we raised \$3700. We had many compliments on the play and food.

For about a year, we have pursued the possibility of getting **501(c)3 designation** from the IRS. (We are a 501(c)4 organization). After discussion the Board decided with the new tax law, there is very little incentive for people to give to the League to get a tax deduction (due to the significant increase in the standard deduction) and if someone did want to give a large amount of money for a tax deduction, they could give it through LWVMO's Ed Fund as has been done in the past. Once we receive confirmation that we would get our \$600 application fee back, we will cancel the 501c3 application.

Upcoming Centennial celebration events:

The Secretary of State will present the proclamation for the 100th Anniversary of Missouri's passage of the XIX Amendment on July 8th at 2:00 p.m. in the State Capitol Rotunda.

"One Woman, One Vote" – Film showing – July 14 at 2 p.m. The library will co-sponsor this event.

Voter Registration events – We will have voter registration at the July 12 Boone Electric Cooperative Annual Meeting. We will also have voter registration on July 27 VAC Back to School event; and on National Voter Registration Day on

September 24, at the library, along with our Lunch and Learn.

Census Columbia Committee – Carol reported the LWVMO has prepared a census fact sheet and has prepared a palm card template that we can hand out at our events. We will send a letter to Brianna Lennon to offer LWV help on local efforts for the census count and to ask that Sharon Schneeberger serve on the Columbia Census Committee. Elaine, Diane and Sharon agreed to join Carol and Mahree on the LWV Census Committee.

Lunch and Learn for September-November – Barbara reported that the L&L and CAT TV Committees met to discuss ideas for future L&L events. The library will begin co-sponsoring our L&L programs and hosting them at the library beginning in September. Our September L&L will be related to the One Read book *Nomadland*, about income inequality. For October, the L&L will focus on the census. The November L&L will be on historic preservation. Ideas for 2020 are climate change adaptations; bail issues; importance of local government and voting; and domestic violence.

Suffragist sashes –The Board approved the purchase of 20 "Votes for Women" sashes to sell to members. We think there will be members who would like to wear these in the parade (and to other events) and to have as a memento of this year of celebration.

Board members were encouraged to attend the Columbia City Council meeting, following the board meeting, as the Council was going to vote on the **Climate Action Adaptation Plan**.

CLIMATE ACTION PLAN ADOPTED BY COLUMBIA CITY COUNCIL

On June 17,2019, the City Council approved and adopted the Climate Action Plan. Over the last 18 months, the Mayor's Task Force held about 80 subcommittee and full task force meetings, and recommended about 125 actions.

The City Council acknowledged that a group would need to be assigned the responsibility of making recommendations to enact specific actions. A final decision was not made, but the Environment and Energy Commission, with some increase in membership, may be assigned this job. This work will be done in cooperation with City staff who ultimately either enforce regulations or take the action within the specific responsible departments. Implementation of any of the recommended actions will take a vote of the Council in the future.

A year ago the Council adopted these targets:

- Community-wide Target: Reduce Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions to 35% below the 2015 baseline by 2035, 80% by 2050, and 100% by 2060.
- <u>Municipal Operations Target</u>: Reduce GHG emissions associated with City operations by

50% below the 2015 baseline by 2035, and 100% by 2050.

Clearly using more renewable energy to produce electricity — since it accounts for 63% of the total GHG — is required. All three Columbia electric utilities have added renewable energy since 2015.

I find one action particularly important: "E-1.3.2 Codify through ordinance Columbia Water & Light's responsibility to meet 100% renewable energy generation or purchase by 2035, including parameters for the use of Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) and equity and cost impacts." The existing Renewable Energy Ordinance would need to be modified to "100% by 2035" (from 30% by 2028).

There are significant sources of greenhouse gas which are not addressed in this plan — everything purchased but not produced in Columbia, such as food, clothing, air travel, etc. This all falls upon each of us to address individually.

In Memoriam - Darwin Hindman

Beloved former Mayor Darwin Hindman (and League member) passed away on June 17th. His amazing legacy of leadership on community betterment projects includes: promoting the construction of Columbia's MKT trail as a pilot rail-trail project and then being the founder and chairperson of the Katy Trail Coalition; creative ideas such as Columbia's deposit ordinance; Columbia's innovative sewage-treatment wetlands; and the building of the ARC, a public recreation center. Other causes he supported included the city's Percent for Art policy; a salt drive for Kutaisi, Columbia's sister city in the Republic of Georgia; co-chairing the Citizens Committee for Soil, Water and State Parks in 1996 and 2006; and the creation of a Race Relations Task Force for the city in 1996. He received numerous awards, including our League's Outstanding Citizen Award (along with his wife Axie) in 2010.
